## Raising the Dead: Anglo-Saxon Death and Burial

Burials constitute a large part of the Anglo-Saxon archaeological record, and this session uses the rich East Anglian burial record to explore the range of burial rites practised by the Anglo-Saxons. Subjects to be covered include the human skeleton, cremation, inhumation, the use of grave-goods and the impact of Christianity.
